


Once upon a time, maps lived peacefully in our collections. Mark Twain is seven years old: 1842.



Great Libraries and their Glaciers




Wikipedia Map of Human Migrations by genetics (haplagroups) in years from present






Why do we think there is a "rim" anyway?


- "Pacific Rim" was coined in the 20th century.
- In Mark Twain's day, a southern boundary for the Pacific had no official name.
- "Antarctica" was not on the Atlas he owned.
- Looking for a "rim" on 19th century maps shrinks the size of the ocean we look across.


What Mark Twain saw in the atlas he owned when he looked at the boundary of the Pacific Ocean.




David Rumsey Historical Maps have nearly 30 examples of "Pacific Rims" in advance of the 20th century coinage of that term. (1842)









BAMALA IN BOTAMAN Philadelphia



Entered according to Act of Congress, in the year 1831, by William C. Woodbridge, in the Clerk's Office, of the District Court of Connecticut.








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

GROSSER OCEAN MEERESTIEFEN UND TELEGRAPHENKABEL





Hemispheres do not have land rims.



But they give the correct impression that oceans cover

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- "Pacific Rim" is as much an argument as an observation.
- It began to compete successfully with "Western Hemisphere" in the 20th century.
- Both "maps" were in Mark Twain's Atlas.
- The remarkable thing about Twain was that he was ahead of his time in recognizing the ties of community.

PRDLA in 1996 made a popular choice with the name "Pacific Rim," but a controversial one:

 "The most prominent maritime region to emerge in recent years is undoubtedly the Pacific Rim
Sharp attacks have been launched against 'rim speak.'
